


Water, Peace and Security



By supporting local, regional and international stakeholders, WPS aims to prevent and reduce water-related conflict and turn the vicious cycle of water challenges and instability into a virtuous one of sustainable water management and peace.



WPS Activity in Iraq

WATER-RELATED SECURITY CHALLENGES

Iraq's water stress has reached crisis levels in the past decade, with increasingly frequent droughts affecting rainfall, groundwater, and surface water in the Euphrates and Tigris rivers. Upstream dams exacerbate the issue, leading to decreased water quality and quantity, which, in turn, impacts health, agriculture, and causes problems like displacement. Dissatisfaction with national water management practices has led to conflict and instability, ranging from political

tensions to violent protests. WPS works to mitigate and prevent water-related security issues in Basra, Wasit, Missan, and Dhi Qar.

SHIFTING ATTITUDES TOWARDS CONFLICT-SENSITIVE WATER GOVERNANCE

WPS's work has contributed to shifting practices and attitudes to conflict-sensitive water governance in Iraq. This began in 2020-2022 with a training programme for national and provincial representatives of the Iraqi Ministry of Water Resources, focused on the need for conflict-sensitive water governance policies. WPS' continued engagement, including the codevelopment of an integrated water system analysis and dashboard, which equipped the authorities to engage on these issues. At a WPS roundtable in 2022, the Iraqi Minister of Water Resources stressed the importance of WPS work for conflict-sensitive water management.

CAPACITY-BUILDING & EMPOWERMENT OF LOCAL ORGANISATIONS


WPS provided local organisations with training for 21 dialogue facilitators on environmental peacebuilding. This enabled them to become effective mediators with regard to water-related security challenges. This prepared some of them to lead the 2023 'WPS edition' of the Dijlah Talks forum in Baghdad, which focused on multi-stakeholder water-sharing agreements, and prepared a conflict-mediation organisation to use environmental peacebuilding tools and strategies in their work.


MOVING FROM COMPETITION TO **COLLABORATION**

WPS encourages diverse water users to consider shared challenges and discuss potential solutions and collaboration opportunities both within and across Iraq's southern regions. Building on WPS research and engagement, WPS supported a local partner to bring communities together through three provincial focus groups, a regional public session, and using a multistakeholder survey to discuss how water users can get involved in mitigating their shared water-related challenges.
